RE: Modifications to NJSIAA Swim Championship Format

To Whom It May Concern,

We, the undersigned New Jersey high school swim coaches, write to express our shared bewilderment and disappointment at the recently approved changes to the NJSIAA Swimming Championship formats, including and especially the elimination of the Meet of Champions consolation finals.

We have to believe the NJSIAA would never intentionally diminish the student-athletes' experience, but that is exactly what this will do. Regardless of what the NJSIAA hopes to accomplish with this arbitrary decision, we are quite certain it will be a detriment to New Jersey's high school swimmers and fear it will ruin the most highly anticipated event of the season. What gain could possibly be worth that cost?

It must be more than wanting to make the Meet of Champions "a really class event," as NJ.com reported June 7. The Meet of Champions already is a high-level meet that has consistently produced exciting races and fast swimming in both Championship and Consolation Finals. Eliminating the consolation finals is more likely to detract from the meet's allure than it is to enhance anything.

And it must be more than a simple desire to apply the same format to all sports. Different sports have different championship formats for the very reason that they are different sports. A prelim/final format with at least two finals heats ("A/B," "Championship/Consolation," etc.) is Swimming's championship meet "industry standard" for secondary-aged athletes and older. This is true for competitions sponsored by USA Swimming, the NCAA, FINA and the IOC. Change for the sake of conformity among unique sports seems misguided.

## Please consider the following:

- We would be remiss not to point out that the NJSIAA just abandoned the meet format overwhelmingly favored nationally.
- During the 2022-23 school year, 41 states held a championship swim meet with a
  prelim/final format, and 37 of those states -- New Jersey included -- held consolation
  finals (just over 90%). Even accounting for the seven states in which the championship
  meet was a single "timed finals" session and the two states for which we could find no
  high school swimming information, 74% of states still followed this standard format.
- The consolation finals actually drive participation at the Meet of Champions; swimmers and coaches choose months in advance which meets they will target for optimizing performance (i.e., shaving and/or resting). These are delicate choices that influence preparation all season and part of the decisions hinge on how many racing opportunities swimmers will get. Fewer racing opportunities on the second day of competition will increase the likelihood that swimmers choose other meets to target for peak

- performance. We are concerned about the possibility *fewer* swimmers attend, declining travel and lodging arrangements with such a risk they won't get additional swims.
- Consolation Finals also play a crucial developmental role for swimmers. Swimming on Sunday at the Meet of Champions is a "high-leverage" situation, akin to a baseball/softball player walking to the plate as the go-ahead run with two outs in the last inning, or a basketball player shooting critical free throws in the late stages of a big game. The only way athletes can learn to perform in these situations is experience, and the consolation finals provide invaluable opportunities to gain it, especially considering the Meet of Champions is the only NJSIAA-sponsored prelim/final meet. Many swimmers who compete for state championships in the "A-Final" first gained experience competing in "B-Finals." These accumulating experiences help them perform not just later in their high school careers, but in college, where they will unquestionably compete under that same format.
- Lastly, this will disproportionately impact "high school-only" swimmers who do not
  participate with year-round clubs. It is already difficult for these swimmers to advance
  beyond preliminaries vying for 16 spots; with half of those spots eliminated, it will be
  exceedingly rare for any such swimmers to qualify for an NJSIAA Meet of Champions
  final in the future.

There are certainly other considerations supporting our position, and we hope the NJSIAA is open to hearing them all. In the meantime, we stand unified regarding those aforementioned; it is our conviction that the consolation finals are a crucial component of the Meet of Champions serving several important purposes and that the rationale provided for their elimination has thus far been misguided and shortsighted. We implore the NJSIAA to reconsider its decision in light of the widespread opposition from those most directly affected, and to correct this mistake before the 2023-24 season.
